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Remembering Joan Wilshire

My mom enjoyed life to the fullest, doing so by making the most of every day spent with family and friends. That was always evident to us, but more so when she retired in 2011 from NCSL in Boulder. She quickly joined multiple clubs: a RV club after purchasing a pop-up camper for the Summer family excursions to Steamboat Lake, a Christian Women's club, a coffee club, a book club and finally a Bunco club! When on a camping trip to Wyoming in 2014 she became the happy owner of a loveable Blue Heeler puppy she named Bandit. I laughed when I had to pencil in time on her full calendar to see her otherwise she might be at a potluck, club social or at the vet when the "fury child" Bandit had been in some trouble!

There have always been classic cars in the Wilshire garage since I can remember it started with my dad's 1955 Chevy 2 door hardtop, so it is a family affair. For my mom it started with the purchase of her first new car, a 1964 Corvair Monza coupe. It was satin silver with a black interior and a 4 speed! I spent many hours wedged in the back seat of that Corvair between my siblings when being driven to school, visiting our grandparents in the mountains or being dropped off at school sporting activities. The Corvair served our family well for many years until it became more practical to have dueling station wagons to haul our family of 6 and all our gear. I never forgot that cool little Corvair.

In 1994 I told my dad I wanted to restore a Corvair together, so the hunt was on to find just the right one. After a thorough search I settled on the perfect one, a 1964 Corvair Spyder Convertible, red exterior and white interior. My dad referred to it as a basket case, because it came with so many extra unknown parts and even the turbo was in the back seat! We were introduced to the legendary Steve Goodman and shortly afterwards he convinced us to join Rocky Mountain Corsa. Much like the other clubs my mom belonged to later in her retirement years, she immersed herself in RMC club activities. My mom wholeheartedly supported the restoration of my '64 Spyder. It was restored in time to make the 1995 National convention held in Dallas, TX. That in turn launched our family into a Corvair love affair for well over 25 years now!

Once the Spyder was restored, Steve of course convinced me that I needed a daily driver, so I could keep the show car clean. I bought a 1961 Corvair Lakewood wagon after attending the 1996 Corsa convention in Albuquerque. I remember back fondly on those early years in the club, because that started our becoming what we refer to as Corvair crazy. I became RMC president, my mom secretary and my dad a trustee for several years in a row. Then my mom supported my dad when he was president and I became activities director. The Corvair crazy that I refer to wasn't just about participating on the Board, attending meetings and organizing club activities, but the garages soon filled with Corvairs of all kinds! My mom got a daily driver, a 1968 Monza coupe teal with a black interior that she thoroughly loved shifting through the gears on the way to work. My dad bought a 1962 Corvair Monza wagon and later some late model parts cars with a dream for a V8 Corvair. In 2002, we headed to Estes Park to look at a 1966 Corvair Corsa turbo convertible for my mom. She wanted to be able to zip around slow pokes on the highway and power through hills in the mountains just like she did in her 1966 Chevelle.

That day we came home with two Corvairs! On the way up to Estes I spotted a 1963 Corvair Greenbrier van for sale. I bought it on my way back with my mom buying her turbo convertible.

I'd like to invite Rocky Mountain Corsa (as well as PPCC, and all Corvair enthusiasts) to an alternate old car universe. It's a place where old cars are driven with a strong dose of aggression, frequently broken, but almost never wrecked or bent. Most of the time, these the race events are for the sheer joy of competition, but over the weekend of August 10 and 11, the mayhem will be in support of a very worthy cause: It is the 2019 Race Against Kids' Cancer, and will take place at the desolate but awesome High Plains Raceway, just an hour east of the Denver mousetrap.



This has become an annual event of Rocky Mountain Vintage Racing (RMVR), and in the past eight years of supporting pediatric cancer research with the Morgan Adams Foundation, over one million dollars has been raised. It's a special weekend, with young patients and their parents on hand, lots of ride opportunities, and many special perks.

Of course, it's also a race weekend, and RMVR typically draws 100 or so vintage race cars across a wide spectrum of classes and types. The selected marque for this years' RAKC race is the Formula Ford single seat open wheel car, in honor of the 50th anniversary of that classic group. If the planets remain aligned, I will have Yenko Stinger YS-066 on the track, and you can almost certainly count on Jon Whiteley's red Corsa racer as well, upholding the honor of America's only rear-engine, air-cooled sporty cars.

Saturday is typically a great day at these races, with lots of lunchtime activities. To support the Morgan Adams Foundation, there are donation laps available, often in race cars, sometimes in exotic street cars (think Ferrari, Lamborghini, and so on – we're not talking just about Mustang GTs or your run-of-the-mill Corvettes!). And when the racing ends on Saturday, there's always a great party, with live music, a serious dinner buffet, and multitudinous libations.

There's no charge for spectators, and the racing goes on throughout the day on both Saturday and Sunday. Saturday is the best show, plus the after-racing festivities. Sunday afternoon sees the racers thin out quite a bit as the day wears on, but there's action on both days until the track goes cold. A note of caution: High Plains is a BYOS/BYOC venue – Bring Your Own Shade/Chairs. You'll want to bring shade (wide-brim hat, sunscreen, etc.) and a folding chair or two. It's a fantastic club racing road course, but still a bit short on spectator amenities... RMVR would love to have RMC visit, and it would be an opportunity for RMC, as a club, as individual members, or both, to support a very worthy cause. I'm personally impressed with the Morgan Adams Foundation's work, as they put the donations to work on research that goes immediately into clinical applications – no big salaries to honchos, just honest effort to help kids in need. It doesn't get much better than that.

Jim Hall of Chaparral Fame and the Corvair Ken Schifftner

When racing (and engineering) enthusiasts think of innovation, the name "Jim Hall" often comes up. A truly inventive and talented individual, Jim pioneered many aerodynamic and propulsion ideas that are currently used in race cars. His use of spoilers, movable wings, and even "vacuum cleaner" concepts (as in his Chaparral 2J "sucker car" was historic. He wasn't reluctant to try something new, even if it was very unconventional. He had training in mechanical engineering and a gift to see what might work versus what might not work. He had family money (from the oil industry) to make his ideas come to life.



Jim Hall had connections to GM. His Chaparral's were typically powered by Chevrolet engines. Since he was racing (often successfully) many articles about the Chaparrals assume the Chevrolet connection was related at least in part to the Corvette. Perhaps this is true given the Corvette's presence in racing, You don't find much, however, about Jim Hall's significant connection to the lowly economy car Corvair.

Enter, Stage Left, the Chaparral's much ballyhooed "automatic" transmission. If you search You Tube you will find a link to an interview of Jim Hall conducted by Bobby Rahal at a RRDC meeting a few years ago. (I simply searched for "Jim Hall Chaparral").

In the interview, Jim explains his Corvair connection and the "automatic" transmission. During the litigation defense of the Corvair, Jim was hired to do handling testing at his Midland, Texas facility. He explains that during that testing, he became familiar with the Corvair transaxle and its fluid coupling (torque converter). Jim had doubts about using a conventional gearbox for the Chaparral thus the idea of at least a one-speed transmission intrigued him.

He basically reversed the Corvair transaxle and used (I'm sure with much initial and future modification) the torque converter as a fluid coupling thus eliminating the plate type clutch and conventional gearbox. They mated the Chevrolet engines to the drive train. The rest is Chaparral history.

Yes, he says the first version was a single speed. The transmission used a "dog type" connection to the drive train that simply was an "on or off" connection (the fluid coupling did the slipping at starting). He apparently matched the engine rpm to the required engagement speed of the transaxle and moved a lever to make the connection. Subsequent versions used two and three speed capability (I'm assuming using planetary gear sets). By using the "automatic" transmission, he could install an auxiliary pedal that could be used to change the angle of attack of movable aerodynamic surfaces (wings, etc.) to suit the track conditions.

Join Us for the 2019 Autocross!



We were drawn to our favorite marque for a variety of reasons. It's a historical, revolutionary, compact, economical car. But it also helped to birth the pony cars in the early 60's and muscle cars of the mid-1960's. It features wonderful sporty handling. There's a reason we aren't in the Falcon or Valiant clubs. We have Corvairs that like to go around curves! (Is there even a Valiant club?)

Going around curves is something our cars do wonderfully, and a feature that drew many of us to the Corvair. And there is an event where we can perform cornering, as well as acceleration and braking, in a safe closed environment. <u>Our last Autocross was in 2013</u>. If you were at the last meeting, you got to see the video from that event, filmed by Tricia Brereton and produced by Natalie Brereton. Since I suggested making the DVD, I guess that makes me executive producer. 8[^])

After 2013, our usual venue at a Rock Canyon High School in Douglas County stopped requiring the lot to be cleared each night. A truck parked in the middle of a planned autocross course will cancel the event as an early morning surprise. I have been watching for a new venue, and recently found a location near my work, around 6th and Union. We had originally planned an event for July 14, but after researching what is required, I determined that we needed a bit more time to promote the event and engage committed participants. I hope you will be one of them!

At the July 12 monthly meeting, we chose <u>Sunday</u>, <u>August 25</u> as our new date. Setup will be at 7am with an 8am start and teardown ending at noon. Lunch nearby will follow at your own expense. The rainout date will be September 22.

An Autocross takes a significant effort from many people. We need setup help, teardown help, timing, tech inspection, and course workers. As a result, we need 15 or more drivers to make it feasible for the amount of work, and to allow worker-drivers to rotate through. A sign-up sheet

gathered a number of committed drivers that night. Don't miss out!

Jeffco School District Transportation Center, 809 Quail St, is our very affordable venue at only \$16/hour or \$80 for the planned 5 hr block covering setup and teardown. The primary expense will be rental of the required cones. The club once had a set of cones for these (once annual) events, but with years of mis-use they fused into a stuck, sunburnt mass. We also had timing equipment which has since decayed as well. So the last few times we have rented cones and used phone stopwatches for timing. The major expense will be



cone rental, at an estimated \$275-\$300. With miscellaneous expenses we estimate a \$450 event cost. Those at the last meeting approved a \$15 per driver charge, and those signed who signed up committed to pay that fee. At the minimum drivers, this covers half the estimated expenses. Spectators are free and must obey the rules of course safety and instructions of the officials. It is my hope to create another video DVD to distribute as well.

DRIVERS WANTED: I am still seeking committed drivers who want to participate at \$15 per driver. Please call me at 303.591.5435, or email me at rsbrereton@gmail.com to sign up. If we have 15 or more signed up and paid by August 9, we will go forward with the event. If not we will have to cancel. The date is 1 week after the next monthly meeting on August 2 at John Elway Chevrolet. Make your checks payable to Rocky Mountain CORSA, with a memo stating "Autocross". If paying in cash, include a note indicating this is for the Autocross. If you can't make the meeting, send your payment to Rocky Mountain CORSA, PO Box 27058, Lakewood CO, 80227-0058.

At the meeting I recognized that many new members had never seen or participated in a Autocross. I showed a presentation, "What is an Autocross". I have distilled it into another included article, improved with pictures and links. Please see the related article about autocross fundamentals. Please contact me to sign up, and pay by the deadline!
