CORSA and membership. In the meantime, CORSA had no other chapter offering a Convention bid. At the Mini- Convention in Springfield, CORSA asked people from the Colorado chapters if, perhaps, Colorado could bid. As a result, that possibility was explored. Locations in both the Denver area and Colorado Springs were searched. Garrie Fox recommended a hotel in Colorado Springs that had hosted many such gatherings. A barn find, really?

You may have read about the so called barn finds from time to time; the Corvairs found in a field in Nebraska left over from a car dealership, the derelict French cars found in a barn in France, an old fifties VW van rescued from an Alpine mountain. Most of these cars had really been abandoned, had remained hidden for years and required an infinite amount of work to restore them. Tony Lawler's recent find of a 1966 Corvair Corsa convertible was in some ways similar to those previous barn finds. It had been locked away for 35 years, but it was never in a barn, it was never abandoned, and it immerged in pristine condition.

The story starts in 1979. Jim Reich was driving to or from work in Longmont when he spotted an ragtag Corsa convertible parked on a curb in front of a home. After seeing it had not moved in weeks he approached the owner with an offer to buy the car. Jim said he paid \$400 for it. The car had been painted a lime green and the top was badly worn. Jim had the car repainted to the original color, replaced the top and performed the necessary mechanical work to



restore the car. He drove it the 1981 Denver National Convention. Afterward he drove the car for several years through the early 80's. Then other Corvair interests took over and Jim drove the car less often but he couldn't part with it. He put the car under a cover in his garage and there it sat for 35 years.

Enter Tony Lawler, Corvair buff extraordinare. Tony joined our club a few years ago and has been very active Corvair collector ever since. He has a 1963 Spyder coupe and just recently restored a 1962 Rampside to a like new condition. Previously he had a very nice 1966 convertible. Some how about 3 years ago he found Jim Reich's garage and saw this beautiful Corsa sitting under a tarp. Tony said it took him 3 years to persuade Jim to sell him



this car. Jim has just recently acquired an 8 door Corvair van and Tony convinced him the car needed to be shown. Purchase price is undisclosed.

The car is absolutely gorgeous. The paint is better than new as is the convertible top. The interior is original but in very good condition. The car is heavily optioned with A telescopic steering column and positraction differential. The engine is the 140hp 4 carb with the 4 speed transmission. Tony said the car needed the brakes redone and the carbs rebuilt, and a detailing. That's it. Well, maybe the tires really should be replaced.

The Preventive Maintenance Series

Trip Check List

This article has been printed and reprinted many times but it still is appropriate especially since some of our members are traveling to Albuquerque later this month. Don't say you weren't told.

The following is a list of items I suggest checking before taking a trip (or after buying a car). Remember that even long trips are usually less than the mileage between a single oil change. Serviced properly, your Corvair will cruise to all of this summer's events and back - and be happier for it!

- 1. All Corvairs roll on four sets of wheel bearings and they all can be repacked. Check & lube the 2 or 4 U-joints. Check front end parts and lube the fittings (install missing ones).
- 2. Have tires balanced and aligned if necessary. Before trips, check all five tire pressures and tighten lug nuts with the tool you use to change a tire.
- 3. Check or change all fluids: oil, transmission, differential, brake fluid, washer fluid and battery level (if possible). Synthetic Powerglide fluid is a very good idea, and with regard to oil, remember that our air cooled engines run hotter and have greater tolerances than newer cars. A higher number viscosity oil such as 20W50or SAE30 is recommended.
- 4. Check the oil pressure sending unit and change this inexpensive item if you do not know its history.
- 5. Check the engine tune, and include cleaning the crankcase vents. Check the breaker plate in the distributor, lube the distributor cam and inspect the electrical connections such as the primary coil wires, alternator wires (no generators allowed) and multi-connectors. Check carburetor inlet nuts for leaks.
- 6. Check the battery date, cable ends, ground cable mount and check the overall charging system with the lights and accessories on maximum.
- 7. REMOVE the belt and check the condition of the entire length. Spin all three pulleys and lube anything questionable. Tools are available to grease the fan and idler bearing.
- 8. Check all running lights, check the fuse block for rust, check the large multi connector in early model engine compartments on the left side (by-pass the 10 gage wire), and check warning light operation.
- 9. If air conditioned, blow out the condenser, check the mounts, the belt, check the evaporator drain. Remove the lower shrouds for better cooling.

- 10. Check the harmonic balancer, and if it is original, replace it! Be sure to check the fuel pump mount, it can work loose. To be safe with the increasing ethanol addition you should have a new version of the mechanical pump or an electric pump. If you already have an electric pump, check the pre-filter.
- 11. Lube your late clutch cable ball and look for frayed cable between the two pulleys under the dash on early models also check parking cables in the same area.
- 12. Check brakes; wheel cylinders, shoes, master cylinder (push rod leak under the dash), and most important, the steel and rubber lines. Give your car the "stomp test" in the driveway. Steel lines above the gas tank and next tothe transaxle are the most prone to rust, with tunnel lines next.
- 13. Be aware of any speedometer error you may have and know your oil consumption rate. Test drive 15 minutes on the highway on a hot day, pack up and head out!

Spares and tools? My favorites would be a belt, a new fuel pump, one rocker arm with pushrod and valve cover gasket, one 30 amp fuse, a set of points and condenser, oil as required, tools for these items, and a CORSA Travel Roster (Cellphone and credit card are assumed to be permanent contemporary companions). There are other tech articles in this series that could help you address many of the above

The Dynatrac

One was at the Convention in Jacksonville, Florida, a few years ago. There, in the parking lot was a Corvair powered Dynatrac. That memory triggered the search for the file.

I found it.

The Canadair Dynatrac was a U.S. Army all terrain, all purpose, vehicle (XM-571) from the mid-1960's. Sitting on tracks like tank rather than on wheels, it was used as a personnel and cargo carrier, ambulance, radio command post, and general-purpose vehicle. It may even have been used to get groceries. Powered by a Corvair engine, the design included an articulated driveline that enabled the power unit to be coupled with and drive up to three (3) similar



tracked "rear units". "The Dynatrac is light enough to be transported, with a 2000-pound payload or 10 fully equipped soldiers, by medium helicopter or transport aircraft into areas which are otherwise inaccessible", according to the Canadair literature. In full three (3) unit configuration it was claimed that the payload capacity was 5000 lbs.

If the power unit was used by itself, it was steered using a clutch and brake system as used in tanks. When coupled with a rear unit, hydraulic actuators were used. It must have been interesting to see it in operation.

In cold conditions, the front "powered" unit used the engine hot air for "comfort" and removable "artic cabs" protected the passengers and cargo. Heaters were reportedly provided for the "rear units".

It was designed to operate at temperature extremes of -65 deg. F to 115 deg. F. And like Ivory soap, it floats. It could swim at a breathtaking "2 mph" (I guess if the current is still or going at 2 mph in the same direction). Top speed was listed at 30 mph.



So, there it was. Sitting in the parking lot. A Convention surprise and fond memory.
