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Rumble at the Rosemount car show

"It was a hot and sultry day", as the line goes, in Pueblo this past July 9th at the 8th annual Rumble at the Rosemount car show. The event was held at the Rosemount Museum (more on that later) and was very well attended by a variety of antique, classic, custom, street rods, muscle, cruisers, and of course a couple of Corvairs. The plans were for more Corvairs to attend, but it ended up only Jerry and Keithann Peevyhouse in their 65 Red Convertible and Mike Piper in his 65 Red Convertible actually made it down there. As you can see from the picture, we had fraternal twins there, not identical twins \bigcirc .





The day started out as a caravan that started in Castle Rock with John and Kathy driving their Lakewood and John's son Douglas and his wife Cassie driving the red 68 coupe and picking up Jerry and Keithann in Monument on their way south. The plan was executed perfectly until we got down close to Colorado Springs when the Lakewood began to smoke and we pulled off to investigate. A quick look under the car showed there was a pretty healthy leak of oil apparently dripping onto the muffler crossover pipe and causing the smoking. Car was running fine, just leaking oil. Not able to confirm the exact cause of the leak, but after a conversation with Mike (already down in Pueblo) it was determined that it was probably best not to drive the car down to the car show. So, unfortunately, John called for a tow truck and both sets of cars returned to Castle Rock. They were missed, not the outcome they were expecting.

This is the first time for PPCC attending this car show, but maybe it's one we might consider doing again as it was very well run and with no entry fee was very affordable. There was plenty of big trees around the museum that provided great shade in the morning, not so much in the afternoon. As you can see from the pictures, there were a good variety of car types there, which made it interesting for everyone attending. Mike and I had a great location that drew a lot of foot traffic by our cars. In addition to all the car related stuff, they even had shaved ice for the kids (adult kids too) which was a big

hit on such a hot day. Originally, SeeMore was scheduled to appear, but we couldn't find a way to transport the car down there. One of the organizers of the show mentioned how disappointed they were that SeeMore wasn't there.

The other interesting thing they did was having a noon "rumble" where everyone started up their cars and made some noise. Obviously, the hot rods blasted us out of the water, but it was fun to do.

As part of the admission registration for the show, there was free admission to the Rosemount Museum, which is the home of the John and Margaret Thatcher family who built the 37-room mansion in 1893. Over 85% of all the furniture and items in the mansion are original to the family. At Christmas they put up 37 Christmas trees inside the mansion and decorate it for the holidays.

Since this is a combined article, the following are thoughts from Mike's perspective of the car show and travels to it.

I've determined I'm not great about getting up early for an extended drive to a car show so I

decided to stay overnight in Pueblo near the venue. We had a kids movie night at our office in a drive -in format so I went there first, then left at about 21:00 hrs (9:00 PM) to drive to Pueblo. In the process, the father of one of my co- workers, and a former Corvair owner said I should put my top down. I did and it started raining in about 10 minutes. I put the top back up and it quit. The handy thing was my seats and car were wet so in the process of drying them off I cleaned up a bunch of dust.

Away I go. The car has run fine since all of the hassles during the tri-state weekend, so I made good time to just north of Tomah Road on I-25. 75+ MPH to full stop. I spent the next 30-40 minutes at less than 9 MPH trying not to abuse my clutch. I assumed a multi-car accident which turned out to be a paving operation to almost where the old rest stop was south of the Larkspur exit. Off we go again. I'm looking at a lot of lightning that looked south of Colorado Springs, headed east. I thought the messing around not moving would help me miss the storm, but nope. I was into some pretty serious splash back by the time I got to the eastbound highway 24 exit. I was muddling along in rain and road construction until almost Fountain. Then I got into intermittent rain and sprinkles. Some of the northbound folks were driving so fast that when they hit a water puddle, they either had their tires go smack into the water or they threw a wave up over the wall. Fortunately, the waves missed me since my windows were wide open, but I worry about hydroplaning in Corvairs when going fast with water puddles around.



I'd slowed down to about 65 and it was pretty boring until a tired looking Honda came up and hung out in my blind spot for a while. Then he pulled up ahead of me with his interior light on and was waving. I was puzzled at least but I kept going and dropped in behind a couple of cars going about the same speed, and he went ahead. I was staying at a Hampton Inn on the south end of Pueblo, and I pulled in at about midnight. I was getting out of the car and the guy following me came up and asked me where I got my

parts and complimented me on my car. It turns out he has two Corvairs, a '65 and a '66, one of which is a convertible. One runs and the other is a box of parts. We talked until about 1:00 hrs (1:00 AM) and another guest even commented on how long we talked. He knows of Steve Goodman, he tried getting parts from Corvair Ranch, but they were rusty, he knows of Clarks... I suggested some other sources but truthfully, I was not at my sharpest. He lived in Pueblo and commutes to work in the Springs. I invited him to



join PPCC and he took a photo of my decals as a reminder.

My return home was also somewhat interesting. We spent the day in the shade, but it was hot. I needed fuel and went to a Shell station. I think I pulled up to the store to use the restroom but as I parked the young attendant (maybe early 20's) came out to ask me what kind of car that was, and so on. We probably spent 15 minutes. It turns out he likes old cars, and he has a friend that works in an upholstery shop. He really likes the car and said his friend would like working on one. I suggested PPCC again and had him take



a photo of my front emblem, so he'd have a reminder of the type of car. He took several other photos too. He was very diligent because every time a customer entered the store, he left me and took care of them. A very nice guy.

Aside from my eyeballs feeling like baked eggs, it was otherwise a dull trip home. I did stop off at the Palmer Lake ice cream shop to get my ice cream a day early and to cool off. I will definitely try to go next year. The car owners there were different from some of the other shows as were their cars, which I think were mostly local. Their tee shirts for sale were very nice and the dash plaques were quite the works of art too.

As they say, "this one's a keeper" and so as we plan next year's events, this is one to put on the calendar again.

Ages

You've likely heard of the Bronze Age, the Iron Age, the Space Age.

I wonder if our Corvairs were living in the lesser-known Age of The Hubcap? You hardly ever see "modern" vehicles sporting hubcaps. Go to a car show though and there are hubcaps galore.

Take the Brass Era vehicles. They had little hubcaps used to protect wheel bearings and retain the grease required to lubricate those bearings. The vintage vehicle shown in the following picture (I think it is a Mercer) had what looks like brass hubcaps. (Lower right of photo). These caps could be quite ornate. Some were cast metal and were usually highly polished. A lot of time and money was spent on these caps.



Also note the lug nuts. Visible. For some reason in the pre-war era, automobile designers started covering the lug nuts. With hubcaps. The functional but naked lug nuts I guess were considered offensive or at least no longer important to the overall design, so some designers hid them from view. The lower left photo shows the naked lug nuts on my Corvair (Viewer Discretion is Advised).. Lower right is a photo of the same wheel but with a hub cap. Better? No.





Hubcaps of different designs were so plentiful that they became collectors' items. Some people even started their criminal careers by stealing them. Other hubcaps fell of vehicles and ended up being attached to fences or shacks along roads and highways. Starting life at least as a pair or set, they ended up lonely, solitary, waiting for someone to buy them. It wasn't unusual to see dozens of hubcap orphans sparkling in the hot sun waiting, I guess, for a passer-by to scan the collection for the one that flew off unexpectedly or was "lost" when parked during a dark night.

Some hubcaps were "baby moon" type that covered just the lug nut pattern (like the ones on Rick Beets Spyder shown). Some of these baby moons, after being pitted or dented continued life as ash trays. Or maybe a tray to hold small parts. To keep them nice, they needed to be polished and cared for. Some say the chrome baby moon was invented by a metal polish salesman.



Today, some economy cars even have cast wheels. Lug nuts are brazenly on full display though most are plated, covered, or made to look less nut-like. Even EV's have full wheel covers supposedly designed to improve range. Though I guess there is a market for stolen cast wheels and full wheel covers, since basic economics dictate that where there is a supply and demand, money is to be made through theft. Take catalytic converters for example.

So, it can be argued (maybe poorly here) that the Corvair was a proud citizen of the Age of the Hubcap. May the fond memory live on, until of course you need to remove them to change a flat tire. Particularly when it is raining.
